- Understand the minimization of switching functions using k-maps.
- Understand the design of combinational circuits.
- Understand various memory elements and their applications in sequential circuits
- Understand and learn the concepts of memories and asynchronous sequential logic circuits.

- Introduces about dictionaries and hash table representations.
- Introduces about various search trees such as BST, B trees , B+ trees, AVL trees and Red Black trees.
- To understand the concepts of graphs and sorting techniques.
- Introduces about different pattern matching and tries algorithms.

Provide three classes named Rectangle, Triangle, and Circle such that each one of the classes extends the class Shape. Each one of the classes contains only the method print Area () that prints the area of the given shape.
